Proposed Solar Power Station on Land West of Boxted, Suffolk

**Visual Baseline Study** 

February 2024





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Save Glem Valley (SGV) is a group of residents from the Boxted and Hartest area of South Suffolk who are opposed to the plan by RES Ltd to develop a 100 acre solar power plant in the beautiful and ancient Glem Valley. Part of our objection is the severe visual impact that an industrial development will have on the side of a hill in this locally designated Special Landscape Area which has always been rural, part agricultural and part designated Ancient Woodland. We, guided by our professional Landscape Architect, Carly Tinkler BA CMLI FRSA MIALE, wanted to determine exactly where the site will be visible from and whether the contention of the developer's visual impact study that "the development can be accommodated without undue harm to landscape and visual amenity" and "the development proposals will not have an unacceptable adverse effect on the visual amenity value of the wider countryside" is a true and accurate assessment of the likely impact of this development.

Our study involved visiting viewpoints, both public (roads, bridleways, footpaths etc) and residential, within the zone of theoretical visibility. Photographs were taken and the grid reference (bottom left of each photo) noted so that each viewpoint could be cross referenced to the maps. The proposed solar site has been superimposed on some of the photographs (red outlines or arrows) to show the potential visual impact that the development will have on a very wide area of countryside viewpoints.

The conclusion of SGV residents involved in documenting the visual impact are the same as those of our professional Landscape Architect which has been clearly laid out in her report:

"Not only would levels of landscape and visual effects be Major Negative, but also, contrary to the claims in the Applicant's submission, there would be no beneficial landscape or visual effects at all".

Note: Most of the views illustrated are from public footpaths/bridleways and roads unless otherwise stated. The proposed solar farm is defined as 'site'.




Key maps showing locations of where the photographs were taken. These locations are approximate; a more accurate location map can be seen on the SGV website
























Footpath to Lower Somerton emerges through gap in hedge to top of field where there is a vista directly across to the site on opposite side of valley




Limited views from road into Hawkedon – distant views towards site mainly blocked by Hawkedon Church and trees















































View from footpath in Glemsford, northwest from New Street Farm between Park Wood and Lownage Wood

































































About 50 yards up from the Chadacre shooting lodge underneath the telegraph poles five fields of the proposed site can be seen. Moorhouse Farm is also visible
